30 Years of Beach Sweeps Data

Clean Ocean Action (COA) released the 2015
Beach Sweeps Report at Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic
City today, highlighting the twelve most commonly
collected items ("The Dirty Dozen") along with the
most outrageous finds ("The Roster of the
Ridiculous") and the breakdown of 332,003 pieces
of marine debris collected by volunteers last year.

Among the data released, "plastics" was the largest category of the total collected debris making up 70.6%.

Over 70% of the plastic found was single-use plastic.

Clean Beaches are a Major Part of Jersey Pride

"Over the last 30 years of Beach Sweeps we have seen the types of debris change in quantity and quality, but two things remain the same. First, litter, especially plastic, is harmful and even lethal to marine life and it is on the rise. Second, you can always count on the small and the tall to volunteer to help clean up beaches. We call that Jersey Pride," said Cindy Zipf, Executive Director of Clean Ocean Action.

"Of course our goal is to have clean beaches naturally by reducing litter, but in the meantime, we are grateful to all -sponsors, Beach Captains, and volunteers; in total over **111,830 and have** removed over **5.7 million pieces of litter over three decades.**"
