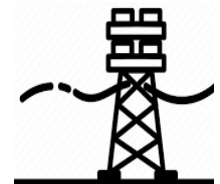
VINEYARD MID-ATLANTIC PROJECT UNTIL FEDERAL INVESTIGATION COMPLETE!
Project Flies in the Face of the Federal Pause on Offshore Wind



VINEYARD WIND MID-ATLANTIC PROJECT FACTS:



- 117 turbines covering 351 acres of ocean floor (266 football fields)
- 13 Megawatts (MW) monopoles
- Promises 2,000 MW annually -- but offshore wind is at best 50% reliable (e.g., 1,000 MW possible)
- 1,665 feet tall (NYC Chrysler building = 1,046 feet)
- 1,050-foot Blade roter diameter
 - Clearance to ocean = 89 feet, yet average container ship height = 100 feet
- 1-2 Electrical Service Platforms = 230 feet tall (almost the height of US Capitol)
- 600+ Miles of high voltage cables



PROJECT OWNER: Vineyard Mid-Atlantic is an affiliate of Vineyard Offshore, which is the US-based offshore wind development company owned by the Danish company Copenhagen Infrastructure Partners, a global fund management company that specializes in renewable energy development.

TOO MUCH TOO FAST: A LONG-AWAITED PAUSE IS IN EFFECT - Despite President Trump’s pause of offshore wind (OSW) development, the federal Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) is accepting public scoping comments on what should be included in an environmental impact statement for the project. This is too much too fast. COA has long called for a pause to allow time for OSW to be based on good science, due diligence and due process—which is long-lacking.

VINEYARD MID-ATLANTIC CONTINUES DESPITE PAUSE: On January 15, 2025, just days before the new Administration took office, BOEM announced the Notice of Intent (NOI) to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for Vineyard Mid-Atlantic, which included public meetings. These meetings were later cancelled yet the comment period REMAINS OPEN indicating that the project is moving forward, which is in violation of President Trump’s Executive Order.

LET YOUR VOICES BE HEARD!

- There is a pause on all OSW projects to allow for a comprehensive review. This NOI process to develop an Environmental Impact Statement should be stopped to allow for that review.
- There is a lack of science, due diligence and due process that must be examined.

4. Type your comments in the box or attach a file, provide your email address, choose organization/individual/anonymous, click box next to “I’m not a robot”
5. Click “Submit Comment”
